

Course Description: This course examines the thought of Michel Foucault within the broader context of postmodern philosophy, focusing on his analyses of madness, punishment, and sexuality. We will explore how Foucault challenges traditional paradigms of knowledge, power, and subjectivity, and how these ideas relate to the production of institutions like prisons, asylums, and systems of sexual regulation. By engaging with Foucault's major texts—*Madness and Civilization*, *Discipline and Punish*, and *The History of Sexuality*—as well as key lectures on power, discourse, and technologies of the self, we will interrogate how these concepts intersect with contemporary debates on identity, control, and resistance. Lectures will help contextualize Foucault's theories and offer critical perspectives on his ideas.

Course Structure: This course will be delivered online in a remote asynchronous format through Canvas. The course operates on a weekly schedule and is structured into 4 units. Each week, I will send out an announcement explaining the week's materials which will consist of assigned readings and video lectures from me. Over the course of the semester, you must respond to 4 (instructor-facilitated) discussion questions. After each of the 4 units, there is an open-book, untimed quiz. If you keep up with the materials, read carefully, and listen to/watch the lectures closely, the quizzes are straightforward. Finally, you must submit 3 short papers (3-pages) and 1 final essay paper (6-8 pages). Due dates are noted on the course calendar in your syllabus.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES

In this course, students will:

- Understand and critique Foucault's theories of power, knowledge, and subjectivity, particularly in relation to modern ideas of madness, penality, and sexuality.
- Engage with key postmodern philosophical themes, such as the critique of Enlightenment reason, historical contingency, and the relationship between knowledge and power.
- Analyze Foucault's conception of the historical development of institutions, including the shift from sovereign power to disciplinary power and the emergence of biopolitics.
- Apply Foucault's ideas to contemporary debates on surveillance, medicalization, gender, sexuality, and state control.
- Critically assess Foucault's methodological approach, especially his use of archival research, genealogical analysis, and discourse theory.
- Develop advanced writing and research skills through essay assignments and discussions that require the synthesis and critical evaluation of complex philosophical texts.

GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Five (5) Discussion Questions - 25%

On 5 different occasions over the course of the semester, you will submit a response to a discussion question. You will then reply to at least two of your posts. These discussions will include instructor moderation and participation.

Four (4) Quizzes - 25%

Using Canvas's quiz feature, you will take 4 quizzes (1 quiz for each of the 4 units) throughout the semester. Dates are noted on the course calendar in your syllabus. If you keep up with the materials by reading carefully and watch/listen to the lectures closely, the quizzes will be straightforward for you.

Three (3) Unit Papers - 25%

At the end units 2, 3, and 4, you will write a 3-page paper (that's 3 papers, so a total of 9 pages) examining your understanding of key concepts from that unit. Each paper will have a specific prompt.

One (1) Final Paper - 25%

At the end of the semester, you will write a 6-8 page paper that critically engages with Foucauldian concepts. This paper is an analytical, argumentative essay that reflects your critical engagement with course materials – it does not require additional research. Be sure to use specific examples backed by precisely chosen textual evidence.

AI POLICY

Given that anything generated by AI has been culled from the web and restated or recreated without attribution (and sometimes even with false attribution), **AI content can be considered plagiarized**.

You are responsible for the information you submit based on an AI query (for instance, that it does not violate intellectual property laws, or contain misinformation or unethical content). To stay within university policies on academic honesty, your use of AI tools must be properly documented and cited, using quotation marks or other appropriate indicators of quoted material.

Acceptable uses of AI

The use of generative AI tools is permitted in this course for the following activities:

- Brainstorming and refining your ideas
- Drafting an outline to organize your thoughts
- Checking grammar and style

The use of generative AI tools is NOT permitted in this course for the following activities:

- Impersonating you in classroom contexts, such as by using the tool to compose discussion board replies or content that you put into a Teams or Zoom chat
- Completing group work that your group has assigned to you, unless it is mutually agreed upon that you may utilize the tool
- Writing a draft of a writing assignment
- Writing entire sentences, paragraphs, or papers to complete class assignments
